

Crew leaves aircraft after it crash-lands at 1222 hours local Iraq time – 27 JUNE 08

After all other passengers are evacuated by helicopter, COL Ceroli, CSM Miller, LTC Goldsmith and 2 members of the Asymetric Warfare Group remain on site, secure aircraft until US ground forces arrive, and enter aircraft to recover weapons, commo gear, night vision and other sensitive items.




Aircraft landed intact and made 600 yard path in a field 10 kilometers outside the airport.




Half of the front landing gear that was sheared off on landing




The other half of the front landing gear

Stryker infantry company from 25 Infantry Division arrives to the secure site and transports us and all weapons, sensitive items, equipment and bags back to Baghdad.



COL Ceroli, CSM Miller, and LTC Goldsmith have probably jumped (with a parachute) out of this bird at Fort Bragg – but never again – this bird is a complete loss.
